PROVINCIAL'S MESSAGE

Our 'solemnities'

THE CARA INSTITUTE CONDUCTED A SURVEY

with young people asking, what aspect of religious life attracts you to a religious community? Many of the responses indicated the element of community life – spirit. If you reflect on your own decision as to why you chose the Missionaries of the Precious Blood, most likely, you would respond, *because of the sense of community and our apostolate*. Each member brings to the community his service, dedication, commitment, and availability.

Our life is sustained by the rhythm of the liturgical year, from season to season, and celebrating community feast days. Our gatherings, being together, are vital as they strengthen our fraternal spirit. These days that are set aside are a time to pause, rest, and be thankful for being able to spend time together; to learn from each other and to deepen our care for one another. These community days, which are set in advance, are to be honored and celebrated as solemnities (with a small 's'). They help to authenticate our spirit of community and give meaning to our ministry. Availability and or lack of being present says much about one's commitment and love for the community. As St. Paul reminds us, *...if one member of the body is hurting, the whole body suffers*. And so, it is true with community life.

A parish priest once commented, "When I notice my parishioners are not attending parish functions or Sunday Mass, for me it is a *red flag*". The same can be said about our availability. Our presence, our desire to meet, and to share our lives are not to be avoided, but it is a blessing. By sharing time together, we learn from each other, we learn about ourselves, we learn to see each other as brothers who are trying to be faithful in our journey of life and vocation as missionaries.



Additionally, we need time to recreate together; we need time to eat together; we need time to hear one another's challenges and victories; we need time to celebrate what we have in common and that which strengthens our union in Christ. And we also need to be aware of the boulders that often stand in the way of full, visible unity and try to

chip away at them, bit by bit.

One of the best ways to do this is by celebrating the *Week of Prayer for Christian Unity*, from January 18 to 25, 2024. The service can be accessed at www.oikoumene.org. In Sudbury, the ministerial association of which I am a part, rotates the church every year and all churches have a role to play in the service. Afterward, we have people eat and drink together at different tables from the food and drink that has been brought by participating member churches, so that we all can get to know one another better and lose any fears or prejudices that may have developed over the years from misunderstandings or even bad preaching about other faith traditions.

I believe that the ecumenical movement is indeed a powerful expression of the charism of the Precious Blood that highlights the work of reconciliation to which we have been called to give our lives. In *Ephesians 2:13* we hear,

But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far away have been brought near by the blood of Christ.

This scripture highlights that the work of reconciling that which has been torn apart is God's doing. We can participate in that healing work by relying on the powerful presence and inspiration of the Holy Spirit to lead us closer to one another in Christ, who Himself unites us in the One Church of Christ by our Baptism.

Indeed, **Pope Francis**, at an International Commission for Dialogue

Community life avails one to grow and be renewed. We impart trust and faithfulness. We gain wisdom and seek holiness, in that, we reflect the love of God in the world and in our ministry. As missionaries, we are on the front lines and as well inherit a leadership role which can be physically, emotionally, and spiritually exhausting. Taking a step back in the comfort of our brothers, we can *resoul* our fraternal and ministerial spirit.

Let us be thankful for one another and let us not forget — knowing that someone cares and is thinking of you means that you are valued.

So, mark your calendars. Make it a priority to attend our community feast days, our *mini solemnities*, which enkindle the flame of our community spirit.

2024: YEAR OF PRAYER

After the year devoted to reflecting on the documents and studying the fruits of the Second Vatican Council, Pope Francis has proposed that 2024 should be marked as a year dedicated to prayer.

In preparation for the Jubilee, dioceses are invited to promote initiatives to remind people of the centrality of both individual prayer and community prayer. One idea might be for "pilgrimages of prayer" to be organized at a diocesan level – these would be effectively courses or 'schools of prayer' with monthly or weekly meetings, presided over by the local bishops, but open to the entire People of God.

In addition, to help mark this year more fruitfully, the Dicastery for Evangelization will publish a series of "Prayer Notebooks", with material taken from the many forms of prayer to be found in the rich Catholic tradition.

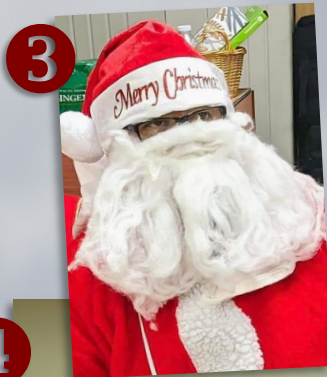

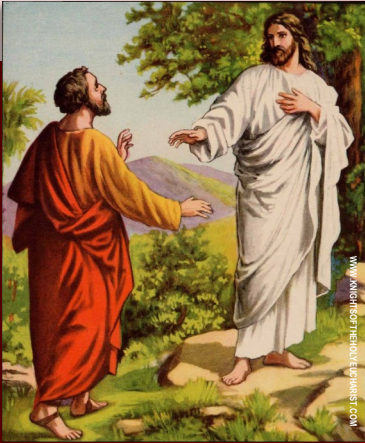
