PROVINCIAL'S MESSAGE

READING THE LIVES OF THE SAINTS reveals how they faithfully dedicated themselves to God. Their stories teach us the path to holiness and inspire us to strive for sainthood. Pope Francis often encourages us to pursue this divine calling. In this Jubilee Year of Hope, we are invited to become pilgrims of hope, walking the journey toward holiness and sanctity.

As members of the Missionaries of the Precious Blood, we can look to Blessed John Merlini as a shining model of holiness and perseverance. His life serves as a testament to living faithfully and opening oneself to becoming a saint. Perseverance was a defining virtue that shaped his ministry. Merlini's humility was deeply intertwined with the courage he needed to face life's challenges. He placed unwavering trust in God's plan for him and for the community. It is likely that he devoted countless hours to prayer, allowing the Holy Spirit to guide and inspire him—to live faithfully, love patiently, and serve wholeheartedly as a brother to his confreres.

Loving everyone is not always easy. Yet, we are called to accompany and understand one another with hearts open to the Spirit's prompting. At the center of any family or community is the Holy Spirit, who sustains and teaches us to love one another. Though we are imperfect, as only God is perfect, we grow in holiness through the wisdom and grace that come with time and faith. The Holy Spirit lavishes us with many gifts to aid us on this journey.

Among you, who best exemplifies understanding? Who stands out in patience? Who demonstrates endurance in the face of trials? Let our aspirations this year be to embrace hope, grow in holiness, and lift our hearts in gratitude to the Lord for the gift of His boundless love. St. Gaspar embodied this calling; Blessed Giovanni Merlini illuminated it—may we bear witness to it with joy and thanksgiving.

Consider these virtues—perseverance, God's grace, patience, humility, and courage—as stepping stones to grow in holiness and answer the call to sainthood.



The Sacramental Journey of Hope

AS an ordained permanent Deacon of the Catholic Church, I have had the unique privilege of receiving all seven sacraments. The sacraments have been a sacred gateway, offering an abundance of hope as they serve as tangible signs of God's invisible grace. They lay the foundation of my journey.

My personal sacramental journey of Hope began as an infant when I received the sacrament of Baptism. Cleansed of original sin, Baptism marked the start of my journey toward salvation and eternal life. It bestowed upon me the gift of a new life in Christ and serves as a profound reminder that I am a pilgrim on a journey of Hope, knowing that I belong to the Christian family.

As a young boy, I next received the sacrament of Reconciliation. For me, this sacrament embodies the hope of forgiveness and healing. It compels me to acknowledge my human frailty, invoking humility and restitution simultaneously. Amid the guilt, despair, and failures woven into the fabric of my human nature, Confession provides a path of hope to healing and renewal—both in spirit and in body. I have found that receiving this sacrament routinely is both fruitful and transformative. For sinful people to grow in holiness, one must first recognize transgressions, confront emotional wounds, rebuild trust, and restore a connection with God. Reconciliation, therefore, remains a sacrament of hope, assuring me that I can always return to God and begin anew.



My sacramental journey continued at my first Holy Communion. This sacrament provides me with the ultimate hope of communion with Christ. At the heart of my Catholic worship, it nourishes, strengthens, and fortifies me to endure life's challenges. The Eucharist reminds me of God's presence in my life, filling me with hope.

At the age of thirteen, I received the sacrament of Confirmation. Empowered by the Holy Spirit, Confirmation deepened and strengthened the graces I received at Baptism. This sacrament, therefore, is my hope for strength and empowerment.

When I was twenty-five, God gifted me with my wife, and I received the sacrament of Holy Matrimony. Marriage is the sacred union between a man, a woman, and Jesus. It affirms the value of commitment, sacrifice, and mutual love, particularly in times of hardship. This sacrament provides hope by empowering couples to live out their vows with faith, hope, and love.

It is truly hope upon hope.

The next sacrament on my journey, Holy Orders, was the pinnacle sign of hope in my life. As a permanent Deacon, I am honored to be perceived as a representative of the Catholic Church, regarded as a light of hope. The sacrament that gives me hope by serving others also provides hope to those I serve, as I guide and care for them during their times of need. It is truly hope upon hope.

Last October I experienced the sacrament of Anointing of the Sick after being hospitalized due to a fractured hip from a bad fall. A priest friend comforted me with this, bringing me hope both physically and spiritually, while reminding me of God's ongoing care.

Ultimately, my sacramental life is a constant reminder God's grace is always available to me, no matter the challenges I face. In this Jubilee Year of Hope, the sacraments have consistently sustained me and will continue to sustain us as we navigate our journey as Pilgrims of Hope.
