Jesus Jesus Sent His Apostles OUT TO

PREACH THE GOOD NEWS. As they moved about preaching and healing, they began to doubt if people were listening to them. They returned home tired, weak, and discouraged. Jesus reminded them that they had the support of a community of faith.

We, too, have the support of a faith community, i.e., our faith parish communities, USC members who share in our spirituality, individuals who have embraced our spirituality and live it in their lives, those who quietly pray for us each day, and our fellow confreres with whom we live, share meals, ministry, and pray together.

We are part of a larger group of believers who help and sustain us in our ministry. We learn to trust one another. These individuals support and give us strength so that we may witness to the Lord. Trusting each other gives new birth, which changes us. It renews our spirits with hope to improve who we are as missionaries.

Jesus had his mother, Mary, who supported him throughout his ministry; Peter, James, and John, who were his closest friends and they listened: Martha and Mary, who provided days of rest and comfort. The Gospel of Luke tells us that 'about one hundred and twenty persons' became the core of the early church community. Each of these small communities tells us that we need each other. We cannot fulfill our apostolate on our own efforts. God has given each of us as true gifts to one another, to appreciate and to learn from each other. Let us remain open to welcome and receive what we can offer to the community. It is the gift of Christ's love. Let us be thankful for Him giving us our brothers and sisters, who motivate us in our daily tasks.

By *welcoming* the Word of God into our hearts, we adopt an attitude of listening. *Listening* attentively is being receptive to God's grace and abiding



presence which He is offering. It takes time to develop a listening heart. As we listen well, through our prayer time and listening to one another, we begin to hear His voice and learn His voice. We come to know Him better, and God's presence is growing within us. Then with a grateful heart and spirit we become thankful. Thankful that He is with us. He has not abandoned or forgotten us, but walks humbly with us. Are we listening well? Can we encourage and trust one another to be a better missionary with charity? Are we open to hear God's voice in each other? Let us welcome new life so that we can flourish.



In our Province, we are fortunate to celebrate Thanksgiving twice each year: Canadian Thanksgiving (October) and American Thanksgiving (November). Thanksgiving and gratitude are the spirit of the day. It is so easy to forget that thanksgiving is not reserved for one day but to be lived every day and being grateful empowers our thanksgiving. St. Paul writes, *Thank God in everything no matter what the circumstances may be, be thankful and give thanks, for this is the will of God for you who are in Christ Jesus.*

Being thankful is one of the most acute feelings that we can have. When we become negative or complain, this attitude weakens our spirit. This depletes our hope. Every day we can find something to be thankful for if we make an effort to see it before us.

As you know, I am recovering and improving slowly, but well from stomach cancer. I have learned to live with cancer. I can admit that God is giving me strength each day and blessings are happening. I live with hope, and this is a fine reason to give thanks.

It is normal for us to acknowledge that we all go through difficult times at one point in our lives. St. Paul reminds us that he too had to learn to be

content either way with failure or glory, with sickness or health (*Philippians 4:12*). He realized that complaining and self pity are not good or healthy, but we should be thankful and content. This allowed him to accept his circumstances.

A thankful person is a happy person. If we want to be people of joy, then we need to be grateful. Quickly we can compare ourselves to others and think about what we want or do not have or what others possess. Really this does not please God and it robs our joy. Again St. Paul teaches us that we are not to be anxious and to pray about everything and in thanksgiving. (*Philippians 4:6*). God is not interested in giving us more; rather, we should be more thankful and appreciative for what God has given and what God is doing for us.

Try a simple exercise. Each morning, for two weeks: think and write down on a piece of paper three things for which you are grateful and most thankful. Let your heart hear it and voice your gratefulness.

At all times and for everything giving thanks in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ to God the Father. – Ephesians 5:20



Let us pray and know that we are indeed blessed and ask our Lord to help us remember how good He is to us always.

SPIRITUALITY

No shade, no shine, no butterflies, no bees No fruits, no flowers, no leaves, no birds — November!

Nineteenth-century poet Thomas Hood captured the essence of the month in a rather negative sense in this rhyme and, while it does capture the month from a climate point of view, it does not tell the entire picture. Traditionally, this month is characterized by the moniker, 'the month of the Poor Souls' when the church, on the second day of the month, recommends all the deceased to our prayers. We here in the Diocese of St. Catharines gather at the cemetery, where many of the bishops, priests and deacons are interred, for prayers for them and for all the faithful departed. St. Gaspar had a special place in the Congregation's prayers to remember especially the deceased members and benefactors on that day and for the entire month.

As Sacred Scripture says, *It is a good* and wholesome thing to pray for the dead. (Maccabees 12:46) It is therefore a fruitful use of our time to recall the many people in our lives and in the Church's past who have contributed to our appreciation of the presence of God in our lives. Perhaps the best word to describe this month is: **REMEMBER!** To remember that God is always with us, to recall the gift of faith given to us by our family, friends, and even occasional strangers who edify us by their trust in God. To appreciate Jesus's outpouring of his Blood that we might have life through Him. Recently we were reminded in a Catholic publication that there is not enough appreciation for the Blood of Christ in our worship. Perhaps it would be good to reinvigorate that understanding in our lives, our homilies, and our own example.

On November 1st. we remember all the Saints of the Church and their fine example to us. Also during this month, we remember two Province members who celebrate their birthdays: Gary Luiz (18) (age 73) and



William Mnyagatwa (20) (age 77). We also observe the death anniversaries of two members: Oreste Cerbara (1990) and Patrick Sena (2012). It is also during November that the Province celebrates American Thanksgiving, this year on the 24th

of the month. So it is, all in all, a good month. A month to remember, to celebrate, and to give thanks. *Happy November*! – EBART

It was a day to celebrate our spirituality, community life, and a clear reminder that our mission is ongoing, it never ends. The day led each member to a deeper understanding, appreciation, and living out the gift of their missionary vocation.

Even in 'retirement' we can still be a powerful presence and a light that shines. As we are sent out to the world to touch, to heal, to listen, to be present, to celebrate the sacraments, to preach, we partake in the awesome power of the Blood of Christ. ST. ALPHONSUS PARISH REACHES OUT FROM ONE INNER CITY TO ANOTHER

Our tiny parish of St. Alphonsus in midtown Toronto continues to be a source of inspiration. Throughout the year, we collect food and clothing and donate the collections to St. Michael's and All Saints Anglican, a nearby community church which oversees *Out* of the Cold, an outreach program. This program provides a warm lunch, twice a week, throughout the year for the poor and vulnerable.

Recently, the parishioners of St. Alphonsus moved beyond the city limits and are now helping the Carmelite Sisters in the Philippines. The Sisters prepare home-cooked meals, then distribute the food packages to the homeless and the poor.

As of June of this year, 12,000 lbs of non-perishable food items and used clothing have been shipped from Toronto to the Philippines.

At our Provincial Assembly in May, the Atlantic Province agreed to donate \$2,000 to this wonderful project. Br. Anthony and the parishioners of St. Alphonsus are to be commended for this initiative. The lyrics, 'He ain't heavy, he's my brother' by the Hollies, continues to be proclaimed boldly and generously. Being attentive to the signs of the times, the Missionaries of the Precious Blood, through the leadership of various missionaries, have always impressed on the people to be watchful of, and responsible for, the less fortunate. As St. Gaspar del Bufalo fed, nursed, and cared for the poor of Rome, so our present Missionaries also follow our patron's example.
